


OREGON'S NEW DISTRACTED DRIVERS LAW

The crew finished cleaning stormwater mains this month, and ended their season with a nice catch. While cleaning, sewer/storm, crew members Paul Havens and Ian Eglitis encountered a blockage in a 21 inch concrete stormwater main beneath Town Center Loop West. The crew could not get past the object, which was located beneath a median near Les Schwab Tire Center. Video inspection showed what appeared to be a 12 inch rock, lodged sideways in the line. The crew tried to dislodge it, but to no avail. Finally, they were able to hook it with their large nozzle and were surprised to find that it wasn't a rock at all. It turned out to be a very dense root ball, growing into a joint from the trees above. These fine objects are commonly referred to as "root monsters" by our crews. This one weighed about 25 pounds. Great catch guys!





SMART FLEET HVAC PROJECT

Facilities

Contractors are putting the finishing touches on the Smart/Fleet HVAC line set replacement project. Late this summer, facility crews were in the process of addressing some minor HVAC issues when it was discovered that the existing refrigerant lines were leaking. After repairing 11 leaking fittings it was decided that the entire system would need to be replaced. Contractors removed all of the existing aluminum line sets and replaced them with new copper line sets which is the preferred industry standard. Facility crews took advantage of the existing system being removed from the roof surface by installing roofing mounts to the adjacent parapet wall, allowing the line sets to be mounted out of the access pathway.
