

Wood Students Head to Washington, D.C. for Constitution Competition Thirty-Five Wilsonville Eighth-Graders to Compete in 'We The People' Invitational

Walk into Linda Koller's second period class at **V** Wood Middle School and you'll likely find 35 eighth-graders deep in research or engaged in rich

debate, ranging from analysis of the constitution to the societal impact of recent executive orders.

The depth of learning you might expect to find in an advanced high school or collegelevel course is the norm for Koller's students. For months, they've



Wood is the only Oregon middle school selected to compete in the prestigious We the People National Invitational in Washington, DC. During May 4-8, they'll be among some of the brightest young minds in the country, competing in simulated congressional hearings at the National Conference Center.

This is the sixth time that Wood has competed. The school has performed well previously, often finishing in the top five. This group hopes to become the first

Wood team to win the competition, which scores teams on their depth of knowledge, understanding of the constitution and ability to apply constitutional principles.


In addition to Koller and colleague Matthew Bell, volunteer community

members are providing unique knowledge and guidance in areas of historical and current constitutional issues. Students are divided into teams, working with their assigned coach to prepare testimony for a series of known questions, while also studying and researching in anticipation of follow-up questions from expert

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Task Force Zeroes In on Preferred Site for French Prairie Bridge

FRENCH PRAIRIE BRIDGE

21-member community advisory task force Ahas recommended a preferred location for the proposed French Prairie Bridge, a project to provide an alternative to I-5 for pedestrians, cyclists and emergency vehicles crossing the Willamette River.

In February, the project's Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) provided an evaluation of three sites under consideration. Each location was scored against six criteria, including transportation connectivity, economic benefit and neighborhood impacts.

In April, the French Prairie Bridge Task Force reviewed the TAC technical evaluation at a public meeting. Where the task force differed with the technical evaluation, scores were adjusted to reflect stakeholder consensus.

This assessment revealed a clear advantage for alignment W1, the western-most of the three options. The site is located at the northern terminus of Boones Ferry Road at the Willamette River, adjacent to the

Portland and Western Railroad facility.

Among the proposed site's advantages:

- Highest rated for safety and connectivity, including easy linkage to Boones Ferry Road and the Ice Age Tonquin Trail.
- •Best access for emergency vehicles.
- •Compatibility with future expansion and improvements at Boones Ferry Park.
- ·Least displacement and disruption to residents and businesses.

The French Prairie Bridge Task Force voted unanimously to recommend the W1 site. On

May 21, City Council is scheduled to consider the recommendation and approve a resolution identifying the preferred bridge alignment.

The Project Team will soon begin community engagement activities to identify a preferred bridge type. Interested community members will be able to view and provide feedback on four alternatives at a September open house.

Notice of Public Hearing 'ear 2000 Urban Renewal Area Amendment for the 'Boeckman Dip' Bridge Project

Monday, May 7, 7pm, Wilsonville City Hall, 29799 SW Town Center Loop East

The Wilsonville City Council is scheduled to conduct a public hearing on Monday, May 7, to consider an ordinance substantially amending the Year 2000 Urban Renewal Plan to increase maximum indebtedness by \$14,509,101 to help finance the "Boeckman Dip" Bridge, a major transportation project located on Boeckman Road, east of Canyon Creek Road. The ordinance, if approved, is subject to referendum. Adoption of the Amendment may impact property tax rates for general obligation bonds approved by voters prior to October 6, 2001.

The City held a Jan. 17 open house to present information on the urban renewal area and proposed road project. This hearing has been continued from Feburary 22 to allow the project team additional time to complete work on concurrence from overlapping taxing jurisdictions, a required step for adoption of a substantial urban renewal amendment. know ahead of time, but it's the follow-up questions you really need to be prepared for," said student Jake

Students say teamwork and critical thinking will be key to a successful showing. Speaking in front of large crowds and high-ranking judges can be nerve-racking, so preparation and trust in one another is vital.

"Our team has gotten to know each other a lot better and we've worked really well with one another," said student Dalton Mermis. "I've really enjoyed this team and getting to know everyone."

Beyond the opportunity to learn and compete, students will tour monuments and landmarks oozing with history.

"This program is all about the kids, about the experience that they have and about the experience that they will bring home," Koller said.

Participation in this elective class is an experience that will likely stick with participants for years to come. It's an opportunity they don't take lightly.

"The impact of government decisions can change our lives, so this is very important information to have, and the public speaking element is also going to be super nice to have for job interviews and for life," said Brighton Ring.

"Ramp-to-Ramp" Lane Solution Draws Public Support **Proposal Gets Nod from Survey Respondents, Planning Commission**

recent survey to solicit feedback on a proposed **A** "ramp-to-ramp" lane to ease I-5 southbound congestion over the Boone Bridge shows public support for the idea.

The survey was included in an online open house detailing the results of the I-5 Boone Bridge Congestion Study, a report prepared by the City and the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT).

Seventy-five percent of the 282 respondents favored the ramp-to-ramp solution recommended by the City and ODOT to address the bottleneck that routinely delays evening commuters. They voiced nearly unanimous agreement that ODOT should invest in operational improvements, citing frequent congestion, spillback onto local roadways, and unpredictable travel times.

The new lane, beginning at the Wilsonville Road I-5 on-ramp and extending south to the Canby-Hubbard off-ramp, would be designed for construction with future seismic upgrades to the Boone Bridge.

Recommendations from the Congestion Study have been incorporated into a draft I-5 Wilsonville Facility

Plan, which is available for review and public comment until May 29.

The draft plan received support from the City's Planning Commission in April. On June 4, the City Council will hold a public hearing to review the plan, which is scheduled for consideration by the Oregon **Transportation Commission** in mid-July.



POLICE CHIEF'S CORNER

Disaster Preparedness: Are you Ready in the Event of an Earthquake?

Scientists predict there's about a 40 percent chance that the region will get hit with a great earthquake — magnitude 8.0 or larger — within the next 50 years. While we would be very excited if that percentage were our odds of winning a lottery, these numbers are more perilous. Studies show we are grossly unprepared for a major disaster.

One of many issues is that first responders – such as public works, firefighters, emergency medical services and police — would be hampered by the fallout of events, delaying response times. Many government personnel could be injured or stuck and unable to respond.

The higher the magnitude, the more likely it is that we would lack the infrastructure and equipment needed to respond to an overwhelming number of service calls. Because earthquakes and aftershocks can strike anytime without warning, planning ahead and equipping your home for this event is a critical step that can help minimize injuries and suffering to your family.

The current recommendation is that you are prepared for a week or more without access to food, water, plumbing and other resources we take for granted. Here are a few suggestions:

• Gather supplies, including a water supply or portable filter, non-perishable canned food, lights with batteries, a first aid kit, and a small radio. Make sure everyone in your household knows where these supplies are kept.

• Keep any needed medications handy, as well as a supply of comfort items such as pillows, sleeping bags and coats.

• Be ready to communicate without cellular

service. Have plans if the children are at school, and know school protocol. Examine your commute, recognizing river crossings or other overpasses that may compromised. Designate a meeting or check-in place and out-of-state contact.

• Know how to turn off home water and gas supplies, and

how to get water out of water heaters as clean water

- Coordinate with trusted neighbors to share resources, identify special skills and anyone with special needs, including children, elders and people with disabilities.
- Consider alternative options for lodging if your structure fails. RV trailers and can be handy for temporary living. Propane grills can provide a heating source for cooking.





City Grant Awards Support Community Tourism Efforts

The City of Wilsonville's Tourism Promotion Committee has awarded \$44,000 in grants to assist seven local organizations in providing events and attractions that bring visitors to the Wilsonville

These awards come from two programs, both funded by lodging taxes paid by overnight visitors: \$25,000 from the City of Wilsonville

"The seven organizations we are funding this year have successfully drawn visitors in past years to Wilsonville and Clackamas County," said Parks and Recreation Program Manager Brian Stevenson, who administers the grant programs. Cumulatively, these efforts make Wilsonville a great place to live and visit."



The Parks and Recreation Master Plan provides a community-driven vision and long-range guide for Wilsonville's parks, facilities and community programs. Additionally, it prioritizes short-term and long-term needs and provides approximate costs of

Currently, the seven-acre park in Wilsonville's Old Town neighborhood includes a playground, an open lawn area and a basketball court. The park is also home to the Tauchman House, a popular location for City-sponsored programs and private rentals.

The master plan guides development of four acres of forested waterfront property to the east, three undeveloped acres to the west (between the railroad tracks and Boones Ferry Road) and three forested acres to the north. It also accounts for the possible installation of the French Prairie Bridge, which would provide pedestrians and cyclists passage over the Willamette

City Council Approves Budget Adjustment, Affordable Housing Tax Exemption, Tourism Promotion Marketing and Wayfinding Signage Plan

During the March 19 meeting of the Wilsonville City Council, the Council held a public hearing and authorized a supplemental budget adjustment for the current fiscal year to account for changes in project cost estimates and reclassify certain expenses.

Major adjustments that total \$3.6 million include reimbursing the West Linn-Wilsonville School District \$1.4 million for infrastructure work related to improvements of Advance Road for the new Meridian Creek Middle School; \$1.18 million for road construction projects in the I-5/Wilsonville Road interchange area; \$437,000 for improvements to Boeckman Road; and \$385,000 for Library remodeling improvements.

The Council granted annual property-tax exemptions to five multi-family facilities—Autumn Park Apartments, Charleston Apartments, Creekside Woods LP, Rain Garden LP and Wiedemann Park—that provide 366 residential units of affordable housing. These exemptions allow the facilities to provide lower-cost rent to families, seniors and individuals meeting income qualifications.

The Council approved a professional services agreement in the amount of \$200,000 with Vertigo Marketing to implement a two-year tourism marketing-promotion campaign designed to promote Wilsonville as a destination to out-of-area markets and ultimately increase overnight lodging tax revenue to the City. State law requires that a certain amount of local lodging-tax revenues are to be spent on various tourism-related programs, including promotion.

Council renewed the City's janitorial services contract for a one-year period in the amount of \$186,000 with TVW, Inc., which is a state-certified 'qualified rehabilitation facility' employing individuals with dis-

abilities that local governments must use.

The Council acted on a \$125,000 contract with Alta Planning and Design to undertake a community-wide wayfinding/directional signage strategy and develop sign-design specifications. The project includes fabricating and installing a number of signs, including possibly the two existing monument signs at I-5/Wilsonville Road interchange.

During Mayor's Business, Mayor Tim Knapp read a proclamation designating April as Parkinson's Awareness Month and updated Council on progress toward an amendment of the Year 200 Urban Renewal District to increase the maximum indebtedness to fund the Boeckman Dip Bridge. The hearing is scheduled for May 7.

Transit Director Dwight Brashear discussed amending the Transit Master Plan to accommodate House Bill 2017, which requires transit providers to include analytics, strategies, upcoming projects and other details to qualify for state funding. SMART staff also detailed a pilot program to offer shuttle service to and from Charbonneau and a one-year agreement with the City of Canby to extend service with four weekday mid-day round trips between the two cities.

The City Attorney advised that the pump slot allocation issue with respect to the City's water treatment plant had been resolved, allowing the City to move forward with an intergovernmental agreement that forms the Willamette Intake Facilities Commission for operation of a shared intake facility.

At the conclusion of the City Council meeting, a brief Urban Renewal Agency Meeting approved a proposed supplemental budget adjustment allowing \$358,000 in additional funding for four projects.

Upcoming: City Council to Consider New Garbage/Recycling Agreement

At the May 7 meeting of City Council, the Council is scheduled to consider an ordinance governing the City's solid-waste franchise with Republic Services, which provides garbage and recycling services. The City's existing agreement with Republic Services has been in place since 1982.

If adopted, the ordinance would initiate a new agreement with Republic Services that would com-

mence July 1. The new agreement provides for smaller annual, inflation-indexed changes in rates (rather than periodic, and generally larger, rate changes) and would adjust the City's franchise fee to 5%, commensurate with the rate paid by other service providers. Rate



adjustments would be phased-in over time.

A \$2.50 monthly recyclables surcharge, effective July 1, is included in the agreement. This surcharge is a response to a collapse in the international market for recycled products, and could be removed by Council at a later date if market conditions improve.

Two four-year positions on the five-member **Library Board** are being appointed. The Library Board assists the Library Director in planning activities, and advises the City of budgetary and policy considerations relating to the Library's operation and development. Board members monitor the quality of library operations, encourage cost effectiveness in all areas of library services and periodically review policies and procedures. The Board meets monthly, typically on the fourth Wednesday of the month, at 6:30 pm.

The **Tourism Promotion Committee** is appointing three voting members to three-year terms. The 12-member committee is composed of seven voting members who represent the greater Wilsonville-area hospitality and tourism industry and five non-voting members who provide advice and consultation to the committee. The Committee is charged to implement the Wilsonville Tourism Development Strategy and oversee City-County tourism-development grant programs. Direct connection with the hospitality and tourism industry is required; applicants need not work or live in Wilsonville.

The Wilsonville-Metro Community Enhancement Committee seeks to fill a three-year term. The seven-member committee includes two City Council members and a Metro Council member. Over the course of two or three spring meetings, this committee reviews Community Enhancement Program grant submissions and makes funding recommendations to City Council. The Community Enhancement Program is funded by a per-ton charge on biodegradable solid-waste delivered to the Wilsonville Republic Services waste-transfer station.

When Solicitors Knock, Be Cautious and Ask For ID



With an increase in dry weather, you may see an increase in solicitors, who make their living going door to door to sell magazines and other items.

In accordance with City of Wilsonville code (sections 7.000-7.080), solicitors 16 and older must register with the City, work for a company with a business license, pass a criminal background check and wear a City-issued solicitor badge. Children are not subject to these guidelines.

Unfortunately, not all solicitors obtain proper documentation, so residents should be cautious when answering the door. Ask to see the solicitor's City-issued badge, which must be worn in plain sight. If the solicitor is not wearing their badge, insist on seeing it.

Approved solicitors are required to:

- Respect "no soliciting" signs at all times
- Refrain from leaving fliers or pamphlets on private property
- Solicit only between 9 am-8 pm.
- Show respect to the people they solicit
 Violation of these requirements can result in
 revocation of a solicitor's permit. If you encounter
 someone peddling or soliciting without a badge, call
 the Police non-emergency number, 503-655-8211.
