




Q2 How many arts, culture, or heritage activities did you do within the city of Wilsonville during the last 12 months?





Q3 Which, if any, of these activities did you do in the last 12 months? (Select all that apply.)






Q5 When you think about the arts, culture, and heritage, do you think of it as something you need or don't need?





INTRODUCTION / BACKGROUND INFORMATION

As part of the developing an Arts, Culture and Heritage Strategy, the City of Wilsonville is undertaking a "cultural assets inventory," which is a listing of the people, places, organizations and events recognized as a community's self-expression of culture. That is, a cataloguing of people's lives and values as expressed in art, music, stories and personal connections that make the Wilsonville area unique. Area residents are invited to nominate a wide range of people, places, organizations and events as a "cultural asset."

The survey for submission of cultural assets is open for public input through July 31, 2020.

The cultural assets inventory is foundational to the advancement of an Arts, Culture and Heritage Strategy that provides a roadmap for supporting the development, growth, and sustainability of vibrant local culture. The inventory helps to identify existing cultural assets and the challenges and opportunities facing these assets, and can also suggest gaps within existing cultural assets and the cultural life of Wilsonville. Additions to the cultural assets inventory are public records to be reviewed by members of the Arts, Culture and Heritage Strategy Task Force as part of the planning process.

Definitions

By "arts" we mean those practices and disciplines that grow our expressive minds, skills, and encourage creativity and compassion.

By "culture" we mean those traditions, skills, practices that unite us and from which we draw our individuality, and also practices that build our critical thinking and awareness.

- By "formal culture" we mean primarily public, private non-profit, or private-for-profit heritage, history, humanities organizations or individuals (cultural practitioners/cultural workers) and their work.
- By "informal culture" we mean experiences such as community theater, singing in a church choir, traditional or social dancing, belonging to a book club, or participating in a community garden.

Both formal and informal culture are elements of a healthy community culture.

By "heritage" we mean those events, sites, elements of our culture that are inherited and have a special place in our collective memory. "History" chronicles our past.

These definitions are grounded in the understanding that we are all a product of and participate in culture: we inherit parts of our culture and are continually making, changing, and transforming other elements of our culture. (2018 Clackamas County Plan for Arts, Heritage, and Humanities)

How can a cultural inventory be used?

A cultural asset inventory can be:

- A starting point for cultural planning that helps create common understanding of a community's cultural resources and areas of challenges and growth.
- A vehicle to better understand local cultural organizations, groups, practitioners.
- A tool for people looking for a specific cultural practitioner. For example, a school may turn to the inventory to find artists, crafts persons, historians, storytellers and others who can support the work of classroom teachers.
- A great way for youth and others to learn skills of research and dig deeper into key elements of their communities. The process builds new connections, engagement and, pride in community.
- A community organizing tool a way to know community members and identify their special skills and talents, and ultimately connect them with programs, services, and the cultural life of the community.
- A tool for planners and community developers looking for creative avenues of revitalization, community development, or community promotion.
- A tool for reaching creative practitioners needing assistance with recovery from the coronavirus pandemic.





Christopher's entire life has been in the world of arts. He spent a professional career as a high school art teacher for which he has great acclaim. Personally he is an accomplished painter. His works have been displayed in many places throughout this city and others. Musically he writes, plays, and performs. He has a small group that has been performing around this area for decades.

Fun in the Park/Wilsonville Celebration Days has always existed to purely be a benefit for the people of Wilsonville. Fun in the Park's roots are based out of Wilsonville Celebration Days, which started all the way back in the 1970's, which not only are we proud of, but also feel the importance and value to continuing on something that has such history for Wilsonville. There are endless examples of how Fun in the Park has been a 'connecting ground' for many different organizations, people, and groups who do tremendous work in the community, as well as physical representation of togetherness.

I Helped the city for 14 years with the sculpture program , including the design of the pads currently used. I worked with public works and staff of the city to create the program , including contracts , and all related to the program/

I served as President for about 20 years when I worked at the Wilsonville Library. I am now Treasurer. We have the purpose to collect, research, educate others regarding Wilsonville's story. We have

collected and now store the many Wilsonville artifacts in the attic of the Library - we do not have a common Center in which to display/archive them.

No personal information - I do not know what you wany.

People pursuing a diverse, inclusive, and equitable Wilsonville through intentional dialogue, advocacy, and the celebration of human dignity and belonging. Our Purpose Diversity is the presence of differences within a setting, which aids in greater productivity, problem-solving, enriched perspectives, and efficiency. We pursue diversity through recognizing gender, age, sexual orientation, race, ethnicity, physical and mental health, and other attributes. Inclusion is all about individuals feeling welcomed, respected, valued and involved. As with equity, inclusion is not a natural derivative of diversity. The act of inclusion seems simple: involve others. However, there is much more to it. Equity is giving attention to the advantages and disadvantages that exist among groups and individuals, identifying a correction of those inequities, and working through relationships to increase access to resources and opportunities in the pursuit of just outcomes. Equity is equally about the process, as it is the outcome (e.g. housing, transportation, education, etc.). Go to WilsonvilleAlliance.org for more information.

Soul'd Out is an acceppella group at Wilsonville High School that has repeatedly performed in national competitions. It performs mostly at the school for various performances and only occasionally in the community. The School also has a number of other instrumental and choral groups that could contribute much more to the community, as well as more public displays (other than just at the school) of the variety of art work produced by students. The only community presentation of student artwork is in a tent at the Festival of Arts in Town Center Park. The Spring Fest is also a huge cultural asset to the community with its student talent show and simply the community coming together for such an event.

The History Pub is a monthly presentation provided by a combination of McMenamins, the Wilsonville Library Foundation, and the Wilsonville Boones Ferry Historical Society. McMenamins sponsors the program in a number of the restaurants throughout the area, and many of the speakers rotate between several of them on a person by person basis and interest level. The program involves historical topics from around the Northwest. Local history is often presented in trivia questions and one entire program recently was devoted entirely to Wilsonville History specifically (the program was video taped and is currently available to the public on the City web site).

The I-5 Connection is a local community choral group organized specifically to tour the local retirement and nursing home facilities and sing for the residents. There are some 35-40 members strong, and they sing the songs of the era that the residents remember and love to sing along with. They have their own non-profit status, but are based out of the local community center.

The Salmon Cycling Classic was a community/regional bicycle event that provided a 60 and a 90 K ride and a community 25 K for families, etc. The event was followed by a catered cedar plank salmon feast for all riders. The State of Oregon has a history of a strong love for bicycling and the event created a local event for area riders and an opportunity to personally visit many locations with gorgeous vistas of the area. The name of the event was taken from the native importance of the Salmon to the area.

The Society has about 23 different historical markers on the street side of a variety of historical locations throughout the City.

The Society is endeavoring to collect items of Wilsonville history, preserve them and the area history, eventually display the items/photographs, and encourage/promote the historic, cultural, and cultural history of the area to area citizens.

The Willamette is central to our historical past and continues to play a huge role today. Put it to use. This could be done in conjunction with Butteville Store and the park.

The Wilsonville Road underpass under I-5 - the walkways on both sides covered with ceramic tiles made by local school students depicting local flora and fauna of the area and local landmarks.

There is a station to decorate sugar skulls, and visual art done by students on display. Dance groups perform, and several music groups do as well. The members of the dance/music groups are both students (K-12) and older community members. There was also some food available last year--perhaps other years as well.

This annual dinner features the various bands and orchestra, the choirs, the drama department and visual art displays. While this is a fundraiser for MAPS, it's really the best of what Wilsonville has to offer for an evening of arts and culture.

How is the cultural asset that you identify significant to local culture and area people?

1) It's one of the few "tourist attractions" Wilsonville has. 2) It demonstrates much of the amazing background of our community - settler and natural. 3) The tiles were actually made by several hundred community school children. 4) It is the first artistic underpass allowed by ODOT in the area - if not the State. 5) It presences makes the intersection feel like "ours" rather than just another ODOT typical underpass.

According to one of its display stands, the park has a history dating back to the pioneers. Every day there are people from the surrounding neighborhoods walking or running around the trails (even despite COVID), and I've seen two different people there doing professional-looking nature photography.

Arts make the city with out it you have nothing

First of all, it involves young people directly in art presentation in and to the community. The community experiences music and the presentation of visual arts directly in their own community.

He founded the Wilsonville Festival of Arts. Then along with Theonie Gilmore they kept it going for over twenty years. he has been a supporter to the Charbanneau Arts Festival during its lifetime. He has participated in a variety of ways in the development of many of the city art displays. He has attended a significant number of art focused meetings over the years hoping that the city would begin to participate and support the arts in more concrete ways.

It is not only the oldest event that still takes place in Wilsonville, but the largest by far.

Celebration of the rich diversity within our community. We want to have fun and further inclusive events, celebrations, and spaces in Wilsonville.

Provides an outlet for local business and the community at large to get to know and support each other

The bicycling 'culture' is very strong in area and in Wilsonville. This provided a local event for riders to participate it.

The History Pub program brings live people to the City to talk about history once a month. Audience questions are encouraged. This makes history a 'live' thing for the participants. Also, the program is held in one of the oldest buildings in the City. Additionally, McMenamins walls have many prints of historical photos from the Historical Society's collection. The program makes history available for all with a dinner, a drink, or just to come and enjoy.

The I-5 Connection brings the songs of the 40's, 50's and more to the nursing home residents and helps bring back many memories for them of past experiences, what it was like, and the happy moments they

had in their youth. The chorus sings popular songs, movie and stage songs, and more. They help keep alive some of that old music and do so for the benefit of those shut-in nursing facilities.

These markers help preserve the history of the area in a public way, and allows citizen participation directly with local history.

This event is a wonderful celebration, but also educational for people that are less familiar with the Dia de los Muertos celebration. While the focus is placed on Latinx members of the community and Mexican traditions, it is a great opportunity to bring multiple cultural groups together.

We are the only organization locally actively endeavoring to involve history into our current culture here in Wilsonville. We are also in the beginning stages of a long process to develop a historical trail in and around Wilsonville. We also co-sponsor the monthly History Pub.

We research, archive Wilsonville history and educate citizenry.

While the Willamette is central to our history and heritage, it remains central to our way of life (including traffic jams) today. We can even invite the Sprit Mtn. Casino to operate a river-based casino.

Definitions

By "arts" we mean those practices and disciplines that grow our expressive minds, skills, and encourage creativity and compassion.

- By "formal culture" we mean primarily public, private non-profit, or private-for-profit heritage, history, humanities organizations or individuals (cultural practitioners/cultural workers) and their work.
- By "informal culture" we mean experiences such as community theater, singing in a church choir, traditional or social dancing, belonging to a book club, or participating in a community garden.

Both formal and informal culture are elements of a healthy community culture.

By "heritage" we mean those events, sites, elements of our culture that are inherited and have a special place in our collective memory. "History" chronicles our past.

These definitions are grounded in the understanding that we are all a product of and participate in culture: we inherit parts of our culture and are continually making, changing, and

transforming other elements of our culture. (2018 Clackamas County Plan for Arts, Heritage, and Humanities)

How can a cultural inventory be used?

A cultural asset inventory can be:

- A starting point for cultural planning that helps create common understanding of a community's cultural resources and areas of challenges and growth.
- A vehicle to better understand local cultural organizations, groups, practitioners.
- A tool for people looking for a specific cultural practitioner. For example, a school may turn to the inventory to find artists, crafts persons, historians, storytellers and others who can support the work of classroom teachers.
- A great way for youth and others to learn skills of research and dig deeper into key elements of their communities. The process builds new connections, engagement and, pride in community.
- A community organizing tool a way to know community members and identify their special skills and talents, and ultimately connect them with programs, services, and the cultural life of the community.
- A tool for planners and community developers looking for creative avenues of revitalization, community development, or community promotion.
- A tool for reaching creative practitioners needing assistance with recovery from the coronavirus pandemic.

A place where there is diversity of THOUGHT, where we are all welcome to express ourselves & love for our country without being shouted at or called racist by angry liberals. The nasty BLM signs with vile anti-law enforcement messages were an abomination!! What happened to our once peaceful city??

A rich diverse cultural life in Wilsonville for me would include the following: An Art Center where visual artists and performing artists, and musicians could come together and share their work with the public. An art center where artists come together to brainstorm for planning future events, perhaps demo's and small group classes for the community. This art center could have a small co-op gift shop where crafts people and visual artist could sell there creations, with a portion of the proceeds going to continuation of support for the art center. A place where fundraisers for the arts could take place to benefit the arts going forward. These fundraiser's could include local wineries, restaurants, and other business's. There could be an area dedicated to showing a local Artist of the Month and an area focused on showing a local student "Artist of the Month". An outdoor amphitheater for outdoor performance's or gatherings in the warmer months. There is a building that fills these requirements for this vision right now. It's located adjacent to an historic 140 year old Wilsonville chapel that is still being used today by the same Frogpond Church members. There is an opportunity for the city to purchase this building (sanctuary), with space for parking and outdoor events while Frogpond church retains its historic chapel and adjacent buildings for worship and community service activities. With a central location and complimented by the ongoing 140 year old church, it could be a wonderful example of Arts, Culture, and continuing heritage of Wilsonville coming together.

A variety of programs in a suitable facility(ies) which will allow the diversity and ages of the community to feel that there are a number of programs that they would wish to attend.

A way to walk from neighborhood to neighborhood- How about a small outdoor amphitheater In each neighborhood —like the one at Montague park —an outdoor space for people to sit outside and listen to a speaker. If we had a central performing art space that featured different neighborhoods from time to time it could be used for community meeting places and small low key art fairs. Quarterly - on a certain Sunday people could walk through each neighbor & stop in each one and gather and have a little farmers market/art fair of sorts.

Our community nurtures individual fulfillment and sense of belonging.

Encouraging art galleries to locate here. We have amazing artists of every medium here in Wilsonville and vicinity. Encouraging the development of a craft center where artisans have a space to lease or rent short term to practice their craft. Including blacksmithing, metal working, pottery, leather working, woodworking, printing, lithograph, sewing, fabric arts. Wilsonville is one of early communities in Oregon. Boones Ferry Road and the ferry was the I-5 of its day. This town played an important part in Oregon's history in both positive and some negative ways.

Needed is an indoor venue for year-round events. Needed is public awareness of opportunities to participate. Needed is more variety in the professional offerings of musical and theater.

I envision a Wilsonville culture which makes Wilsonville a "destination" instead of a "pass through" spot. Tourists bring in money. One of the most vital yet underused asset is the Willamette River. I forsee a narrated event which tours the River from Canby to Champoeg, is with a renewal of the former "Boones Ferry Days" festival and offers attractions (tours, walks, vendors, etc.) which draws visitors/tourists and citizens and money. I envision a use of virtual education as to Wilsonvilles diverse cultural talents.

I envision more culturally linguistic events that the community can participate in and learn from others. More celebrations that include the Latino community. For example honoring important holidays like Dia de los Muertos, Las Posadas and Dia del Niño. More meetings like the upcoming Latinx Family Meeting would also be wonderful. Thank you for considering this feedback. I'm happy to see our city taking the steps to create a more culturally diverse and inclusive community. Feel free to reach out if I can help in any way. I envision multicultural celebrations throughout the year either in conjunction with or in addition to the high school's programming; a community theater for performances, classes, camps, event space (like Gallery Theater in McMinnville), and some kind of programming like a First Thursday Art Walk each month.

I envision Wilsonville as a diverse, inclusive, and equitable place where cultural diversity is celebrated and supported. .

I like the Rotary concerts...more diversity in performances would be welcome. I'd love to get my kids into drama without driving them to Lake Oswego. I envy Sherwood for its YMCA and Old Town and Robin Hood Days. If Wilsonville had just a bit of that it would be great. I'd also like to see the old bowling alley turned into a nonprofit coffee house / pool hall / community hangout. I don't know what it needs to be, but it's a big space with potential.

I see Wilson as a empty cultural zone for the most part. I am a senior so at this point having interesting arts related activities is mostly what I want. But developing sustainable arts programs and cheap facilities for arts groups to use is required. I have done my share of travel and places like Japan and South Korea do a fantastic job of promoting, developing and providing access to all the arts is fantastic. I highly suggest you look there if the City of Wilsonville really wants to make this area a place to love and not just a place to sleep at night.

I would like to see development of a cultural center with large enough facilities for concerts, plays, and movies as well as small enough ones for lectures, poetry readings, or book club meetings. My dream also includes a space for an art gallery that features art from Wilsonville and the surrounding area. The model I have in mind is the Lakewood Center in Lake Oswego.

I would like to see lots of public art throughout the community. Opportunity to learn more artistic and cultural skills More public music events. Can't wait for the Town Center plan to be implemented to develop gathering places for cultural events.

I would love to see lots of street sculpture and display. It not western. I don't understand why we have western themed entrances to town center and a couple of other places I've seen. I would like our " ukture" to be somewhat more sophisticated with modern sculpture work. Maybe some professional murals

I would love to see more public art that represents a variety of cultural backgrounds and experiences. It seems most communities have historically documented the white (often male) perspective very often, but less representation for other groups--yet they are also an active part of every community. Public art can be a reflection of what we value and a visual representation of the stories we tell about ourselves. In the future, when we look back on the pieces that have been chosen for our community, let's be proud of who was given a place to share their work and their view. I love the art work under I-5 along Wilsonville Road, because it centered on work of children in our community. I'm glad that signage will help people understand what went into the art. That seems like it is an important step that isn't always included.

I'd like to see more cross-cultural events that celebrate many different cultures. I'm sure we have folks from lots of different cultures living here. (I know Portuguese, African, French, German, Italian, Canadian, Indian, Korean, Thai, and Chinese people who live in Wilsonville.) It would be nice to learn about and celebrate them as well as ones not represented in our demographics.

I'd love to see an arts district developed...a gallery or two, wine or coffee shop, dance studio, yoga, community art center, theater. Lots of public art and student gallery installations.

Live, work, play - the idea of the 15 minute suburb where you can eat, shop, live, work, and play within 15 min proximity Tight integration with agricultural community and viticulture community - leveraging unique proposition and proximity to farms and vineyards with farmers markets, outdoor events, tasting rooms, etc within city limits Bikes, bikes, bikes - becoming biking capital of I-5, developing everything with best biking trails around in mind European - perfect mix of commerce and residentially; need to have grocery, businesses, tasting rooms integrated into Villebois and other master planned communities (e.g. New Seasons, Trader Joes, 365 Market) Riverside - we have the river running through the city...lets use it.

I think Fun in the Park is a great example of bringing together a lot of our community. Thank you for asking about this! I look forward to seeing the results.

My vision is of a fine arts building that will showcase the performing arts(theater, music, dance) and rooms for visual arts (painting, sculpture, multi media). It will have rehearsal space, performance space and fabulous accoustics.

My vision would include development of a multi-level community celebration that allows participation by local citizens as well as embraces events that could become a regional attraction. A pinnacle regional event could look like the International Pinot Festival involving a weekend of great food created by award winning chefs, guest literary stars, music, dance and theatre performances, movies, and lots of fantastic local wine. Events could be held a various outdoor locations from city parks to local farm venues. The Willamette river could also be host of a floating dinner and wine tasting (on a barge). The event could embrace a full monthly calendar of activities leading up to the premier weekend. It could tie into existing events from world class horse jumping, a local rodeo, golf tournaments, art shows, How about a community salmon bake featuring a menu prepared by a local Native American chef?

Opportunities for all members of the community to become involved in something that allows them to go beyond their everyday life. Opportunities for creativity, participation, expression in multiple genres and ways.

Beers and Wine Fest Seasonal Celebrations Music and Dance Dad-Daughter night out Community Gardens and Markets Community scavenger hunt or Geo Cache. City-County Rec Center with a pool. Or YMCA A World Class I-5 bridge!

People united in one goal.

Placards around town (a self guided history tour) describing historical significance of the places. An open air theater setup with stadium style seating and a stage for musical, dance, or plays. A museum of native culture celebrating tribes that inhabited our region. A cultural center building displaying local art, local recipes, advertising local businesses, local events and offers community classes. Walking/bike trails that pass by the river and connect both sides of the freeway without crossing the high traffic roads. Community sponsored events for the holidays.

Programs which are free or reasonably priced, especially for senior citizens including musical and dramatic events.

The first thing that comes to mind is that Wilsonville needs decent restaurants. Restaurants add so much to the ambience of a city, and many cultural events are preceded or following by a meal out. The best food in this town is at Boone's Junction, of all places. Also, for a country that is increasingly embracing plant-based eating, there are no vegan restaurants and very few vegan offerings at other restaurants. I would be embarrassed to put out a dining guide, like the Chamber does, with so many fast-food restaurants and almost no fine-dining restaurants. Also along those lines, why are there no restaurants and coffee houses in the Villebois Community Center? It's such a no-brainer and those establishments would be full instantly if they were any good. In a post-covid world anyhow. An art gallery would be a plus. The library's History Pub is a great historical evening out. An emphasis on the city's history would be nice - when we first arrived we saw signs pointing to Old Town but we could never find it. It wasn't until a walk with the Wilsonville Walkers that I realized we were passing buildings with historic markers indicating any past history. Somehow that needs to be made more clear. I can't comment on anything else because I think if it were not for covid we would have discovered many more cultural opportunities. I think this is a great city and I

really appreciate living here. But we really need those restaurants! And a sense of downtown! Those environments go so far in making cultural opportunities spring to life.

There are far too few local, small businesses in this town. Lamb's was the last grocery store we had that wasn't part of a country-wide, mega-corporate chain, and with it gone my reasons for staying in Wilsonville diminished. For me, Wilsonville is a place of expensive, white-washed neighborhoods, apartment complexes that are too many to count, and one of almost every basic chain store in existence. Seven Eleven, Fred Meyer, Safeway, and lots and lots of Starbucks. The fondest memories that I have of Wilsonville were made when I was at the art festivals, both in Wilsonville and in Charbonneau. There is little to nothing that happens here that is catered to my age group besides those festivals, one of which caters to every age. I would like to include the Farmers' Market as a fond event, but the market here is so small that you need to spend money on something to be a part of it. Here is what I would like to see in Wilsonville: *more affordable houses -not just apartments- so that more people can live here without feeling so much stress to make enough money to stay. *More little shops that offer unique goods - a bead store, a handmade crafts/wares store, a bookstore, etc. *Most Importantly: I firmly believe that this town's strongest point is in the art, thanks in no small part to Christopher Hotola-Hardt and more recently Angennette Escobar, Charlie Hyman, and Philip Clark, all of whom are/were teachers at the two high schools here. The recent SMART electric bus wrap project is an example of their work, and of their confidence in their students. This town is known for its art, and remembered for its students. I want to see a place where students can go to sell their work, side by side with the adult makers of the area. THis would serve several purposes: it would boost the students' confidence in their own capabilities when they get business; it would allow a wider age group to view the students' work as well as the other makers' work; it would allow the more experienced makers to connect with those still in school, allowing opportunities for new perspectives on all sides. I feel that we lack connection, and would benefit from more regularly scheduled community events. The Festival of Art is good, but I would love to see more events like it in other parts of the year.

More clubs and groups for those who are young adults (age 20 to 35). More traditions, for example some sort of duck race in the river.

With the understanding that it's not a high personal priority, I'd say a community that acknowledges how it was formed and the price that others paid (and still pay) for that. I'm not talking about self-flagellation, just not burying it under a need for self-pride. Should we get there, the only other aspect coming to mind is not trying to address multiple cultures by formula. Maybe be informed by members of various cultures themselves?









Do you have programs, key partnerships, or other ways to support non-profit cultural organizations in your community?





Newly selected Commission

What advice do you have for the City of Wilsonville as we develop strategies for ongoing support of local culture? Below is a brief summary of responses.

Collaborations are key. More and more thinking about how to promote the region and other cultural organizations (via our Columbia Gorge Cultural Alliance). Find your team; figure it out together.

Sherwood Center is 100% publicly funded. That is the way to keep quality standards up. Not running it through a 501c3.

Have a dedicated staff person; can't get a program without traction.

Cultivate support with City Council and key community members. Create a sustainable funding stream. Strive to promote art that reflects the identity of the community or what the community aspires to be.

Gather as much information as possible from the community regarding their expectations, needs, etc. As resources for these efforts are so very limited, it is important to make every effort to be responsive the community.

Focus your arts programming within a specific area of the city to begin, such as the downtown core.

Position your program as additive rather than a repetition of something that's already regionally available. Work with your partners in your immediate neighboring communities to collaboratively make something better rather than replicating what works elsewhere.

See this as an opportunity to take the best and highest ideals and operations and make them better. If you can somehow operate within the city's structure (for the benefit of retirement, higher compensation, departmental support), yet have agency over how agile the program can be as an independent non-profit can be, that's the best of all possible worlds.

West Linn's Arts & Culture Commission is just beginning and has been slowed by the COVID pandemic. Working with City Council to create parameters and funding.

Integrate the creative sector into all aspects of City operations; do not treat it as separate. When developing business grants, create an option specific to arts organizations and advertise it as such. When adapting permit processes be sure to offer cultural event and public art permit assistance programs (reduced fees, expedited approvals).

Develop a percent for public art structure (1-6%), both public and private development. These funds can then become grants to individuals who create temporary and permanent art installations. It can be sliding scale as needed.

Invite an arts leader to all civic development conversations (budget dialog, transportation planning, safety planning) because artists can be the conduit for general public to better relate to these developments.

This is fantastic that you are putting together this survey to learn from other local organizations! Thank you for sharing the results. Will they be anonymized at all?

I encourage you to have a funding model that is as balanced as possible. The more you rely on one funding source the more vulnerable you are to a sudden change in conditions. I have seen covid-19 wipe out many organizations that relied too heavily on either ticket sales, foundation support, or government support. A balanced funding model and a robust public/private partnership with the Chehalem Parks and Recreation District has been a key to our success and has allowed us to weather the sudden onset of coivd-19 better than many similar organizations.

Encourage bringing in voices from traditionally marginalized groups as early as possible to shape the project from the start. It is harder to reverse engineer that process and bring them on once things are moving.

Make sure you have adequate funding to get things off the ground. Kick it off with dedicated funding.







Wilsonville cultural nonprofit organizations are stressed; COVID-19 pandemic has worsened their condition










Public art is recognized as a significant cultural asset in Wilsonville








