A New Skate Spot

The City's newly-designed skate space at Memorial Park is nearing completion.

Wilsonville Parks & Recreation staff led a recent effort to re-design and modernize the space, heeding the skating community's request for upgraded amenities. The new design was conceived by

Dreamland SkateParks LLC, informed by thoughtful engagement with members of the skating community.

After demolition was completed by Parks staff, construction began in March. The new space, which is being built within the park's existing footprint near



the sports fields, is expected to be completed by the end of April.

This summer, the Parks & Recreation staff intends to schedule community skate events at the new site.

New Complex to Enable More Efficient Service Delivery *Public Works facility also to serve as City's Emergency Coordination Center*

The City of Wilsonville is soon to break ground on a new Public Works Complex, a \$22.5 million project to centralize and consolidate operations for more efficient delivery of service and better emergency coordination.

Perhaps the most notable feature of the Complex's 17,668 square-foot administration building is that, as a Seismic Design Category IV facility, it is constructed to withstand an earthquake and remain operational.

"Public works employees are first responders," Public Works Director Delora ties are designed for their current operation. The administrative office it shares with the Wilsonville Police Department, for example, crams 26 staff members into a space designed for half as many.

The new complex is designed to accommodate the City's future growth. In addition to administrative work space and conference rooms, the Complex includes protected parking for City vehicles, a large multi-purpose warehouse, chemical storage areas, a truck wash, and other amenities. The complex removes inefficiencies by consolidating people, vehicles, supplies, and equipment in one secure location just north of the Wilsonville's SMART Transit/Fleet building on Boberg Road. The administrative building incorporates sustainability best practices, including energy-efficient lighting. Solar panels installed on the warehouse roof will meet state Green Energy Technology requirements and send power back to the grid. Construction of the new complex is being financed by utilities funds, the general fund, and a low-interest 15-year loan. The City Council has also approved the use of a \$17 million lump sum payment that the City scheduled to receive upon completion of the Willamette Water Supply Program. Negotiated by the City in exchange for the construction of water pipeline in the right-of-way, this money would allow the City to pay off the construction loan ahead of schedule. Requests for Qualifications are being sent out soon. Once a contractor is identified and construction begins, Kerber estimates the project will take about 18 months to complete. Kerber said. "In an emergency, this allows our staff to show up and immediately get to work." The building's durability allows it to serve as

the City's new Emergency Coordination Center, allowing a more efficient and resilient response in the wake of any emergency.

Kerber notes that Public Works operations are currently "spread out all over the city," with vehicles, equipment, and supplies maintained at six locations throughout Wilsonville. The decentralized approach adds time and challenges that slow down the delivery of the unit's core services, which include water, wastewater, and storm water management; facilities maintenance; grounds; road maintenance; and emergency management.

"Staff start their day at the administrative offices, and must often travel to a second site to pick up materials, supplies, and equipment stashed somewhere else," said Kerber. "That may be a few blocks away or on the other side of town."

Furthermore, Kerber says, none of the current facili-

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Legislature Awards City \$1.9 Million for **Transit-Oriented Housing Development**

The Oregon legislature has awarded the City a \$1.9 million grant to support the transit-orient-

ed affordable housing development proposed to be built at the Wilsonville Transit Center.

"The City has our State Representative Courtney Neron of House District 26 to thank for this grant," Wilsonville Mayor Julie Fitzgerald said. "We are most appreciative of Representative Neron's support for the City Council's vision of providing affordable, transit-oriented

housing at the Wilsonville Transit Center."

The City's proposed development is estimated to cost \$33.7 million. The \$1.9 million grant provides funding to provide ground floor space to accommodate a SMART Transit Information Center and other uses that support residents and transit users. For example, the space could provide a home for Wilsonville Community Sharing, the local food bank and social services referral agency.

Because federal and state affordable housing programs fund only the residential portion of an affordable housing development and not space for supportive services, the legislature's \$1.9 million grant helps to fill a gap in the financing plan.

"With this kind of development, residents would have ready access to free SMART transit service throughout Wilsonville and convenient access to employers throughout the Portland metro area, Canby and Salem," Fitzgerald said.

The new construction would provide approximately 100 units of affordable housing for households earning at or below 60 percent of area median income (AMI). Developer solicitation is currently underway, with a project developer scheduled to be selected later this year.

Start Getting Your Home Better Prepared for a Catastrophe

M ilsonville Ready is a campaign to make our community more resilient in the aftermath of a big disaster. It takes an "all hazards" approach to help households and businesses prepare for a variety of emergencies.

Each month, this space tackles an element of preparedness. This month's topic, 'Preparing Your Home," offers

a few useful tips to help homeowners tackle these activities:

- Storing essential documents
- Knowing escape routes from your home
- Learning regional evacuation routes.

Document Storage

Identify all essential documents and store originals or copies in a safe location. Our preparedness page, WilsonvilleReady.com, has a comprehensive checklist that homeowners can use to start compiling documents.

Once compiled, documents should be stored in a safe and secure location. Fire-rated and waterproof safes are available at most home improvement stores for a reasonable price. These boxes should be stored on the lower floor of your home to prevent damage from falling in a catastrophic fire and to make the box simpler to locate. A password-protected, encrypted thumb drive is another alternative for safe electronic storage. This can be placed in your fire safe or other secure location.

Home Escape Routes

Our Wilsonville Ready Partner, Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue, recommends that every family make a home escape plan and practice putting their plan in action. WilsonvilleReady.com includes an instructional video and a downloadable escape plan worksheet with tips on how to prepare a home evacuation route and get better prepared to escape a house fire. 

SMART Continues Its Support of Safe Routes in School Awareness Campaign



With schools back in session full-time, drivers should be mindful of their own ABCs – always be cautious and courteous.

A reminder that the speed limit is 20 mph in school zones in any of the following situations:

• A = anytime a yellow light on a school speed sign is flashing.

City Crews to Flush Water Mains; Rust-Colored Water May Appear

Public Works utility crews are scheduled to begin the annual flushing of the City's water mains. This process scours out mineral deposits to ensure optimal water quality and helps to maintain the City's infrastructure by exercising hydrants, valves and blowoff assemblies and verifying their operability.

Water flushed from fire hydrants often appears to be orange or rust-colored. The discoloration is caused by iron deposits that are stirred up and removed during the flushing process.

After flushing occurs, you may notice discolored water inside your home. This water has been fully disinfected and poses no health risk if consumed.

If you observe discolored water, the following steps are recommended:


• Run your cold water fixtures for several minutes.

• Flush your toilets multiple times.

Typically, water begins to run clear within minutes.

Avoid washing light-colored laundry during and immediately after lines are flushed, as discolored water may cause these items to stain. Continue running cold water until the discoloration has cleared before washing light-colored laundry.

If you observe crews flushing in your area, please share the roadway to give them room to work safely. If you have any questions or concerns regarding the City's annual water main flushing, please call the Public Works Department at 503-682-4092.

Memorial Park Gets Upgraded Individual-Use Restrooms

Visitors to Memorial Park's sports fields and other nearby park amenities will notice a new suite of upgraded restrooms at the site, which accommodates an estimated 105,000 users each year at athletic events. The new restrooms are scheduled to be operational by mid-April.

The new Memorial Park restroom facility includes six individual-use stalls, allowing Parks & Recreation maintenance staff to operate more efficiently, as some stalls can be closed in the off-season when demand wanes. The individual-use restrooms also provide a more inclusive facility than is provided by traditional male/ female restrooms.

POLICE CHIEF'S CORNER

New Web-Based Reporting Now in Place for Some Crimes

The Wilsonville Police department, in partnership L with the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office, has

implemented a web-based reporting system that allows community members to report certain crimes online.

Anyone needing to report a crime where there is no suspect information, no evidence, and no injuries, can now do it more conveniently. Examples of crimes that may be submitted online in-

clude non-injury hit and run, loss of property, theft, theft from vehicle, vandalism and/or vandalism to a vehicle.

Some people may still prefer to call in crimes, and that's OK. No one is required to use this new service, it's simply being provided as an option for those who find it preferable or move convenient. It's available to report any crime that takes place in Wilsonville, Estacada, Happy Valley or unincorporated Clackamas County.

You should remember to turn off pop-up blockers before filing a report and NEVER use the system unless you're reporting an actual crime; filing a false report is criminal. Also, you'll still always dial 9-1-1 in the event of an emergency.

'Tis the Season to Test Sprinkler Systems, Detect Residential Water Leaks

To avoid costly water leaks that can result from frozen pipes, tree roots or other causes, spring is a good time to become familiar with your home's irrigation system.

Here are a few tips to help prepare:

• Perform a visual inspection of the sprinkler system and look for broken sprinkler heads, mushy lawn, pooling, or sprinkler heads that do not activate. All of these can be signs of a leak.

• Check irrigation timer settings. A common cause of high consumption is over watering because of incorrect settings. Some systems, for example, reset to default settings after a power outage.

• Know your system! Knowing the intended usage compared to what is actually being used could help identify a leak or overuse.

• If a leak is suspected, contact a leak detection

or plumber to pinpoint the problem and get it fixed right away. The City does not provide leak detection

services on private property.

• Also, if you winterized your home, don't forget to open your crawl space ventilation!

City to Administer Community Survey


The City of Wilsonville is once again partnering with Polco to administrate the National Community Survey. This process has been undertaken every two years since 2012 to gauge the community's satisfaction with City services and amenities, and with their quality of life in Wilsonville.

By mail, a random sample of residents will be invited to participate in the survey. Polco's methodology produces a consistent, statistically significant set of data that City staff and elected officials can evaluate to measure satisfaction, observe trends over time, and identify where improvements may be needed.

Additionally, the survey is distributed online to allow a broader cross-section of residents to provide additional feedback.

Survey gathering will commence this spring, with results analyzed and provided to the City this summer. Iff will present summary survey data at a future ouncil meeting.
