"It's Time."

After deliberating for months, Councilor Susie Stevens seeks world-wide adventure

Susie Stevens had wrestled with the idea of resigning her seat on City Council for several months before making the decision on May 30. Even then, she said, it took her more than 15 minutes to summon the courage to finally hit 'send' on the e-mail that would make it official.

"Commitments are important to me. This was a difficult choice," said Stevens, whose six-and-a-half year tenure on City Council came to an end on June 30.

Stevens felt compelled by the desire to travel; she wants to begin her exploration in earnest while she remains in good health at 62.

"Life is short," said Stevens, "That may sound cliché, but after experiencing my sister's life-threatening illness and the loss of my husband, those became words to live by."

Stevens' older sister has battled breast cancer. Her husband of 28 years, John Duncan, succumbed to cancer at the age of 66 in November 2015.


Working and being on Council gave me relief. There's no crying at Council meetings. "John was diagnosed and gone within four weeks," said Stevens. "It was devastating."

In the immediate aftermath of her husband's

death, Stevens stayed busy with her responsibilities both on City Council and as executive director of the Charbonneau Country Club.

"Working and being on Council gave me relief. There's no crying at Council meetings," Stevens said.

She successfully sought re-election to Council in 2016. By the end of 2018, two years into her second term, her outlook had changed.



Her desire to travel has already led Susie Stevens to locations far and wide, including Bryce Canyon, in southern Utah, in 2015.

"Here's another cliché — time heals — it's one I believe in. I finally feel like I can move on," Stevens said.

Stevens retired from Charbonneau last summer and spent a portion of the winter traveling, missing several City Council meetings and separating one long trip to the Southwest U.S.. into two segments in order to attend two Council meetings. She knows that schedule isn't sustainable.

"If I could participate remotely, I would do both. I would stay on Council and travel," Stevens said, "but you have to be here for the meetings."

Stevens: It's Time!

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She agreed to cat-sit at a home in Paris for several weeks beginning in early July, which served as a catalyst for her to make the decision when she did.

While excited to visit Paris, her real fun begins in October when she and a friend depart on a two-month backpacking trip through New Zealand.

"Being a vagabond appeals to me more than having a big suitcase and a nice hotel," said Stevens, who will stay in hostels and huts with whatever she can fit into a 25-pound backpack.

Reading travel blogs has provided inspiration. Stevens said many long-term travelers cite taking the initial step as the hardest part.

"Most people who do it end up saying 'why did I wait so long?" she said. "I need to push myself, challenge myself."

Stevens has a long list of destinations on her wish list, including Bali, Cambodia, Vietnam, Costa Rica and Chile. She's also not opposed to changing plans spontaneously when opportunities present themselves.

"In a perfect world, I'd like to go for 4-5 months at a time, then come home for about two months to touch base and see my family and friends," said Stevens, who has friends living at her house when she travels.

Even as she spends months at a time with her feet planted firmly in another part of the world, Wilsonville is still her home.

"I care about this city and the people who live here. That's why I ran for Council," Stevens said. "I've enjoyed working with City staff and my fellow Councilors. I'm confident the City remains in excellent hands, and that the current Council will continue to serve with integrity and in the best interests of our community."

Applications Accepted for Open City Council Seat Until July 22

The City is now accepting applications from residents interested in being appointed to the Wilsonville City Council to fill the seat vacated after the resignation of Councilor Susie Stevens.

The service term begins upon appointment by the City Council and concludes on Dec. 31, 2020.

All applicants must meet eligibility requirements, which include U.S. citizenship and residence in Wilsonville for at least 12 months directly preceding appointment.

An application posted online includes criteria to be considered when Mayor Tim Knapp and Council President Kristin Akervall review applications.

Knapp and Akervall are producing a short list of finalists to be interviewed by City Council. An appointment is expected to be made in August.

MART Transit's Dial-a-Ride service provides doorto-door transportation to Wilsonville residents unable to use fixed-route bus service.

SMART drivers make more than 20,000 Dial-a-Ride trips per year, allowing the City's most vulnerable residents — including those protected by the American Disabilities Act (ADA) — to enjoy a better quality of life

City Seeks Strategies to Provide Affordable Housing Opportunities

To benefit the growing number of community members burdened by the region's lack of affordable housing, the City is developing an Equitable Housing Strategic Plan.

A grant from Metro provides partial funding for the project, which would complete a Council goal and provide a clearer path to affordable housing for people of all household compositions, income ranges, ages and life stages. Completion of the plan is anticipated by spring 2020.

The primary goal of the Equitable Housing Strategic Plan is to identify gaps that are currently present in Wilsonville's housing market and develop a plan with prioritized strategies to fill these gaps.

In June, the City recruited individuals to serve on a volunteer task force charged with guiding development of the plan. The Equitable Housing Strategic Plan Task Force is expected to meet at least three times over the next six to eight months to evaluate current data,



consider public input, provide technical expertise, innovate and develop policies and strategies.

POLICE CHIEF'S CORNER

Summer Revelers, Keep in Mind These Good-to-Know Guidelines

The sun has made an early appearance this year, bringing welcome heat and, with it, many popular fun-in-the-sun activities on the water.

Wilsonville is fortunate to have beautiful parks, and the City provides ample time for you to enjoy them this summer. Parks are open to the public daily, 5 am-10 pm.

To maintain the high quality of parks and for the benefit of those who enjoy visiting, alcoholic beverages are not allowed in Wilson-ville parks, except in conjunction

with pre-approved events and reservations. Additionally, smoking is prohibited in all parks and dogs must remain on their leashes except in approved off-leash areas

Our patrols visit parks frequently to make sure everyone is playing by the rules, and that parks are clear after hours.

Wilsonville follows the state curfew statute, which is enforced between midnight and 4 am nightly. If a child is located in public without a parent or guardian and is NOT engaged in a lawful activity that requires that they be there, that child must be taken

_____ into protective custody.

When protective equipment is encouraged or required by law, use it!

Even driving a car may be a curfew violation in some instances. For one year, newly

licensed drivers may not drive between midnight and 5 am unless they're going to work, driving to school (and no other transportation is available) or they are

accompanied by a licensed driver over the age of 25. Remember, children need some outdoor supervision in the summer, and not just after dark. Summer activities such as swimming, cycling and other out-

sion in the summer, and not just after dark. Summer activities such as swimming, cycling and other outings can present dangers that our children might not recognize.

Supervise in a manner appropriate for their age, maturity and the risks inherent in the activity. When protective equipment is encouraged or required by law, use it! Boating with children requires that they wear an approved flotation device. Cycling requires a helmet. Even when protective gear isn't mandated, it can reduce danger and prevent injury. Better safe than sorry. Oh, and my wife would be disappointed if I didn't mention sunblock!

I encourage parents to talk with their children about what their expectations are for safe behavior and which specific risks should be avoided. Also remember, kids will be kids, so please take extra caution as you drive through residential areas and around town as more kids are out playing, riding bikes, taking walks and enjoying summer weather.

If you're hosting a neighborhood event on National Night Out (see related item), let us know! If the schedule permits, we'd love to stop by to get better acquainted with the people we serve.

I hope these reminders help you and your family enjoy a great, worry-free summer. If something does arise, please know the Wilsonville Police Department is always here to help, any time of the day or night.

Fireworks produce sounds similar to gunshots, which can cause physical and mental distress to those who have experienced combat. Be mindful and respectful of those who may suffer from post-traumatic



stress disorder; these brave men and women fought and continue to fight for our freedoms.

Fireworks also tend to
frighten pets and farm animals. The loud noises can

cause them great anxiety and stress, since they are unable to comprehend what is going on.

Rather than lighting fireworks in your neighborhood, where veterans and pets may reside, consider attending a professional show in your area. If you insist on using fireworks, try to limit the quantity and length of time fireworks will be set off.

Keep your fireworks legal and safe. Oregon law bans fireworks that fly, explode, or travel on the ground

more than six feet — this includes bottle rockets, roman candles, firecrackers, and M80s.

To be legal, purchase all fireworks at a licensed Oregon fireworks stand. Fireworks purchased by mail order or in Washington or at a Native American reservation may be illegal in Oregon.

Under state law, officers can seize illegal fireworks and



issue criminal citations, including reckless burning, criminal mischief, reckless endangerment, and more with fines up to \$500 per violation.

Even legal fireworks are dangerous and can cause injuries and burns. Sparklers can reach temperatures of 1,200 degrees — wood burns at 575 degrees, while

National Night Out is an annual community-building campaign that promotes police-community partnerships and neighborhood camaraderie to make neighborhoods safer, more caring places to live.

The program aims to build community by encouraging neighborhood block parties that unite neighbors and public safety officials to gather under positive circumstances.

National Night Out has sought safer neighborhoods since 1983 by supporting community events – including block parties, festivals, parades, cookouts – that include safety demonstrations, seminars, visits from emergency personnel, exhibits and other activities aimed at supporting safer communities.

No permit is required for events on private property that do not block street traffic. Neighborhoods wishing to close a street to traffic or hold a gathering on public property or in a park, should seek a permit from Brian Stevenson, Parks & Recreation Program Manager, at 503-570-1523 or stevenson@ci.wilsonville.or.us.

glass melts at 900 degrees, according to the National Fire Protection Association.

People can also be held civilly liable for damages resulting from improper use of any fireworks — legal or illegal.

Please remember:

- Only adults should light or handle fireworks.
- Supervise children at all times.
- Use fireworks outdoors on a paved surface, away from buildings, vehicles, and vegetation.
- Never try to re-light a "dud."
- Never point or throw fireworks at people, pets, or buildings.
- Never alter fireworks or make your own.
- Have a hose nearby in case of fire and place "spent" fireworks in a metal bucket with water.

In the event of a fire or medical emergency, call 911. To report a nuisance or concern about illegal fireworks call 503-629-0111. Situations are logged, passed to local law enforcement and investigated as resources allow.

City Mourns Loss of Arlene Loble, Visionary Former City Manager

The City of Wilsonville mourns the recent passing Arlene Loble, who served as City Manager from 1991 until her retirement in 2010.

Loble left an indelible mark during two decades of rapid growth in Wilsonville, including the strategic development of Wilsonville's independent

transit authority, South Metro Area Regional Transit (SMART).

"No single individual has had a bigger impact on laying the foundation for building the city of Wilsonville into what it is today than Arlene Loble," said City Councilor Charlotte Lehan. "She attracted top staff from around the country because they wanted to work with her. She built a talented team and public-private partnerships that continue to carry on that visionary leadership."

Highlights of her tenure include her insistence that the state locate its Wilsonville-area prison in the Coffee Creek area so that the former Dammasch Hospital property could be redeveloped into what is now Villebois.

She was also instrumental in executing the City's plan to draw its water from the Willamette River, as well as the development of Town Center Park and Murase Plaza, the reconstruction of Wilsonville Road, the preservation of the land that is now Graham Oaks Nature Park and countless other projects.

"You cannot drive around this community without feeling a sense of awe and appreciation for everything she helped create," said Bryan Cosgrove, who succeeded Loble in 2011. "I am grateful to Arlene for bringing so many talented people into this organization, and for placing the city on solid financial footing."

Suspension Bridge Recommended by French Prairie Bridge Task Force

At a June meeting, the French Prairie Bridge Task Force unanimously recommended that a suspension bridge be considered for the proposed Willamette River crossing.

The task force's bridge type selection took into consideration public testimony, impact studies, cost estimates and other criteria.


A suspension bridge and a cable-stayed bridge were under consideration for their aesthetic qualities and lower environmental impacts.

"The Task Force felt a suspension bridge was a more elegant, classic design that would yield an iconic bridge that would serve as a memorable landmark to attract users and visitors to the area," said Zach Weigel, the City's Capital Projects Engineering Manager.

If the Task Force's recommendation receives the support of the Wilsonville City Council and the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners, design studies can be undertaken to give the City a better idea of the project's costs and environmental impacts.

The proposed crossing would serve pedestrians, cyclists and emergency responders. The project fills a critical gap in local and regional multi-modal transportation infrastructure, connecting the Portland metro area's Ice Age Tonquin Trail with the northern portion of the Willamette Valley, known as the French Prairie region, and the Willamette Valley Scenic Bikeway that goes to Eugene.



must register with the City, work for a company with a business license, pass a criminal background check and wear a City-issued solicitor badge. Children are not subject to these guidelines.

Unfortunately, not all solicitors obtain proper documentation, so residents should be cautious when answering the door. Ask to see the solicitor's Cityissued badge, which must be worn in plain sight. If the solicitor is not wearing their badge, insist on seeing it.

Approved solicitors are required to:

- Respect "no soliciting" signs at all times
- Refrain from leaving fliers or pamphlets on private property
- Solicit only between 9 am-8 pm.
- Show respect to the people they solicit


